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COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT SUMMARY

Introduction/Background

The City of Greater Geelong allocated funding for the redevelopment of the Chilwell Library in 2022/23 Council budget.

The Geelong Regional Library Corporation and the Chilwell Library Group collaborated on the development of "Design Principles" to inform a preliminary concept design to guide the redevelopment of the community library.

The City undertook community engagement on the design principles and preliminary concept plan between November 2021 and January 2022.

The Design Principles included:

- Community Engagement
- Creativity, History and Culture
- Retaining modesty
- Warm, welcoming, and safe space
- Accessibility and flexibility
- Integration with the park

The preliminary concept plan was developed based on these principles.

The results of the stakeholder engagement, community survey and in person engagements will inform the development of the detailed design in mid-2022, in collaboration with the Chilwell Library Group.



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HOW WE ENGAGED

WHAT DID WE DO?

The City engaged primarily with the Geelong Regional Library Corporation and Chilwell Library Group initially to understand library service requirements and ensure the existing users' needs were met in the redesign.

Design principles were identified, and a preliminary concept design was developed to enable a conversation with the broader local community.

The community were asked to provide their priorities for the design principles and feedback on the alignment of the concept plan with the design principles. Stakeholders have been involved in the ongoing design iterations.

ENGAGEMENT TOOL AND TECHINQUES

A <u>Chilwell Library Redevelopment Have your Say</u> engagement page was developed to provide project information and different ways to engage with the City.

A range of engagement tools and techniques were used to provide different types of opportunities for stakeholders and community to have their say. The main tools and techniques are explained in further detail below

HAVE YOUR SAY ONLINE PORTAL YOURSAY.GEELONGAUSTRALIA.COM.AU	An online HYS project page was designed to share relevant information to encourage community feedback on the Chilwell Library redevelopment – Design Principles and Preliminary Concept Plan
SURVEY (ONLINE AND HARDCOPY)	Survey online from 15 November to 31 January 2022. An extended timeframe was allowed for consultation to ensure ability to participate over the Christmas/New Year period. Objective of survey was to seek feedback and sentiment from the community on the design principles and preliminary concept plan. In addition to the survey, a 'quick poll' asking 'do you think the concept plan is heading in the right direction?' was also on the HYS project page and on display at the Chilwell Library.
DESIGN PRINCIPLES WORKSHOP	A workshop was conducted with the Chilwell Library Group to understand the design principles. The workshop was held in person on 1 December 2021 at the Chilwell Library. Approx. 6 members of the community participated in the 2-hour workshop. The workshop enabled participants to provide their feedback, apply their lived and user experience of the library space to inform the design development.
CHILWELL LIBRARY DISPLAY	The online engagement was replicated as a display at the library. Visitors to the library were asked to prioritise the design principles and say if they thought the concept design was reflective of the design principles.
LISTENING POSTS	5 Listening posts were conducted through November to early December at the Chilwell Library. The listening posts sought to engage people who may otherwise have been unaware of the project, and to collect their input. Community members were invited to take project information

	with them or have a discussion with staff and/or complete a survey and vote on Design Principles.		
POSTERS, POSTCARDS & LETTERBOX DROP	To help inform local residents about the project, postcards were delivered to houses within 600m of the library. To further extend awareness of the project to people travelling to the area, postcards were also delivered to cafes and other commercial buildings near Chilwell Library. Posters were also placed at Pakington Street and at other GRLC libraries.		
WRITTEN SUBMISSIONS	Open at any time during the public engagement period. Submissions could be provided by email or mail.


COMMUNICATIONS

A Have Your Say Page was established.

Social Media platforms used included Facebook and Instagram to promote the listening posts and to direct people to the Have Your Say page.

Printed media methods used included newspaper advert, posters, postcards, A-Frame signage on site during listening posts.

A <u>video</u> was prepared for the HYS Page to promote the engagement.



WHO WE ENGAGED WITH

PARTICIPATION

The City engaged with the Chilwell Library Group to guide the library design development throughout the second half of 2021. Workshops held with the group were focussed on determining agreed design principles and inform the design development.

A survey was developed to seek feedback from the community in relation to the proposed design principles, and the concept plan alignment with these principles.

From 15 November to 31 January more than 1,127 people engaged online with the City about the Chilwell Library redevelopment. Of these approximately 80 per cent engaged online, 20 per cent engaged in person through our five face to face listening post events, and a workshop. The community were invited to share some demographic data with us, primarily through our HYS page.

The following is a snapshot of the people who opted in to provide this information.



The City engaged with the Geelong Regional Library Corporation to inform library service requirements and aspirations for the improved library space functionality.

The City engaged with the Wadawurrung Traditional Owners Aboriginal Corporation. Wadawurrung staff and a traditional owner participated in an onsite walking tour of the existing facility and a discussion about the community engagement, sentiment, the concept design and opportunities to reflect First Nations cultural heritage.

The City engaged with the Geelong Heritage Centre to understand the post colonial heritage of the area and explore opportunities for reflection of local heritage.

FROM THE WORKSHOP


An in-person workshop was held on 1 December to focus on two fundamental questions.

Retaining a warm, welcoming and safe space ranked highest




FROM THE LISTENING POST

Listening post opportunities (5) were conducted in November and early December 2021.

Project information was available and a staff member in attendance. Posters and sticky notes were available throughout the engagement period for the community to add their views outside of the listening posts.




Please rank each design principle from 1-6 (1 being most important to you, 6 being least important) by dragging from the left hand column across to the right hand column in order of priority.











Which of the following Greater Geelong libraries do you currently frequent?




If you don't currently use the Chilwell Library, is there a reason?

FROM THE QUICK POLL FEEDBACK



OVERALL KEY FINDINGS

Qualitative and quantative community and stakeholder engagement and feedback has informed the development of an architectural design for the redevelopment of the Chilwell Library.

Things to think consider as we progress the design:

Design principles were ranked in priority as follows:

- 1. Integration with the park
- 2. Retaining a warm welcoming and safe space
- 3. Retaining modesty
- 4. Exploring flexible, adaptive, functional, and accessible spaces
- 5. Creativity, history, and culture
- 6. Community engagement

The community asked for an additional Design Principle of 'Sustainability' to be included in the design considerations.

91 per cent of respondents said 'Yes" when asked if the concept plan reflects the design principles. Significant feedback was received in relation to the need to upgrade Sladen Park, the open space and playground behind the library.

Commentary included references about the need to improve way-finding signage to direct residents to the library.

Feedback was received in relation to the survey design suggesting the survey was overly complicated and that the City needed to simplify the subsequent survey at detailed design.

NEXT STEPS

- The City is using the engagement results to inform detailed design development in collaboration with the Geelong Regional Library Corporation and the Chilwell Library Group.
- Further engagement with the Community will occur to progress and finalise design in June 2022
